

The Legend of the Rock

Nestled in the foothills west of Fort Collins stands Horsetooth Rock, a famous regional landmark. According to local legend, Horsetooth Rock is the remains of an evil giant's heart cut twice by the powerful Chief Maunamoku, thus protecting his people from the giant's wrath. Today, Horsetooth Rock is a popular destination for visitors to Horsetooth Mountain Open Space.

In this 2,886-acre open space, there are 29.5 miles of trails for hiking, mountain biking and horseback riding. The Wathen, Herrington, Soderberg and Culver families lived in this area in the early 1900s, some on family homesteads. These historic family names remain on many of the trails here.
